



### 5. Basic Strum Patterns

Keep your strumming hand loose and use your wrist rather than your whole arm. If you strum your ukulele too close to the bridge it sounds very tinny (which might be an effect you want sometimes) The 'sweet spot' on a ukulele is usually where the neck hits the body. Most people use their pointy finger to strum. When you strum down, you should be hitting the strings with your nail. When you're strumming up, use the fleshy tip of your finger and keep a regular up/down movement going. But you can use your thumb or all or any of your fingers depending on the sound you want

In some styles you might emphasise certain beats e.g. folk and rock styles sometimes emphasise beats 2 and 4(blowing in the wind; jambalaya; you ain't going nowhere)

There are endless variations on strumming patterns and there are no right or wrong patterns as long as 1: you play in time 2: all players are playing the same pattern

Many variations of the above patterns can be used. Different patterns suit different styles of song.

E.g. New Orleans rhythm (such as for Iko Iko)

Also similar to the "Bo Diddley" rhythm:

## **Beginner Lesson • Reading Tablature**

Sometimes ukulele songs (and those of other stringed instruments) are shown in tablature. In ukulele tablature, the four lines each represent one of the ukulele's strings; I've included the string names to the left of the line to show you. Note that the "bottom" line, is the "G" string.


For many folks, tablature at first seems a bit "backwards" in where you'd guess the notes to be. It sometimes helps to think of holding up your ukulele to the tabalature and you can "see" where the strings/notes are in relation to the lines.

The numbers on the line tell you which fret you need to press that string down. If there's a "0" it means you should pluck it as an open string (no fingers on any of the frets).

If you don't know how to read standard musical notation but you <u>do</u> learn to read tablature, you can quickly "teach" yourself to read simple musical notation by comparing the fingers you're using in the tablature to the note depicted directly above it in the standard notation. Then all you have to do is memorize the "letter name" of the fingers you're playing and you'll also learn to read the treble clef (no bass clef for ukulele--our instruments don't go that low).

Knowing how to read tablature allows you to venture into melody, not simply chords. You can also learn to play "chord-melody" style which blends playing melody with strumming chords; it's pretty impressive and not as difficult as it sounds.

When you see an "X" on one (or more) of the lines, or when you see nothing at all on it, that means not to play that string at all. This is very different than having a "0" on a string—which means that you play that string but you play it "open" (with no finger on the string).

Here's how to "translate" it:


Measure 1: For the first two notes, hold down the second string (E string) at the first fret. For the second two notes, hold down the first string (A string) at the third fret.

Measure 2: For the first two notes, hold down the first string (A string) at the fifth fret. The third and final note in the measure is on the first string, third fret.

Measure 3: For this measure, you're playing entirely on the first string (A string). The first two notes are on the first fret; the second two notes are "open" (no fingers) on that string.

Measure 4: This measure is played entirely on the second (E) string. The first two notes are on the third fret; the last note is on the first fret.

Now let's play a basic melody everyone knows using the notes we've learned on the C, E, and A strings. Observe the quarter notes and half notes, and play with your thumb.



Great melodies never stray too far from our hearts. Often they inspire parodies, like the classic "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star," which we also know as "Bah Bah Black Sheep" and "The Alphabet Song."

Little known and often neglected is the great body of work recorded in the 1920s and thirties by old-time country, blues, and jug bands. Their use of the ukulele demonstrates not only its percussive role, but also the full gamut of uke styling—from intricate strums, rolls, and fingerpicking to tremolo and single-string lead work—all, of course, complimented by scat singing, whistling, yodeling, and other vocal embellishments of the period. Some of these important bands were the Hillbillies, Fiddlin' Powers Family, Jimmie Rodgers, Memphis Jug Band, and DaCosta Woltz's Southern Broadcasters.






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
